He realised it two hours later when he returned

In Ireland

There are a lot of traditions surrounding bereavement in Ireland, many of them rooted in the most widespread religion of the nation, Catholicism. Traditionally, Irish families hold a "wake" when a loved one dies. A "wake" is when everyone goes to the house of the person who has died and the deceased is laid out for people to pay their respects. It is customary to serve food and drinks, pray, and tell stories about the person who has died. The next evening, there is often a "removal" where the coffin is taken to the church and a ceremony takes place. The following day, there is the funeral and then a procession will follow the coffin to the graveyard. Funerals tend to be very big in Ireland and everyone who knew the person will try to come and visit the bereaved family at least once over the three days. It is traditional to send flowers and a sympathy card.


